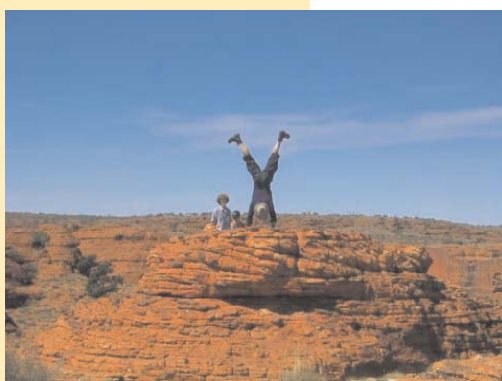


SUBUD YOUTH TRAVEL FUND

In 2009 MSF contributed US\$30,000 in matching funds based on fundraising efforts of the youth. The Guerrand-Hermes Foundation for Peace also supplied matching funds, dollar per dollar, which then made available a total of US\$90,000 for youth travel to the New Zealand World Congress. Some 90 youths have been sponsored by SYA to attend, some of whom will be participating in the YES Quest congress program.

In 2005, MSF provided US\$6,500 in support of youth travel to the Innsbruck World Congress.

During meetings in India, 2006, the Muhammad Subuh Foundation met with SYA coordinators who requested funds to help the youth plan gatherings and coordinate efforts to do volunteer work. MSF developed a plan with SYA for a start-up funding which would be replenished by fundraising initiatives of the beneficiaries. This fund has helped young people from Israel, the Ukraine, Indonesia, Colombia, Ecuador, etc. to attend Congresses and to take part in meaningful exchanges. SYA recipients have written of their appreciation for life-changing experiences.



SUBUD YOUTH ASSOCIATION AND YOUTH ENTERPRISE SUPPORT (YES)

YES is a joint project of Subud Enterprise Services and SYA to support young people in identifying a direction for their life's work and to assist them in the planning & implementation of steps that lead to success. In 1998, MSF provided a grant of \$20,000 for the first year of operation.



YES QUEST AT SEVEN CIRCLES RETREAT

Seven Circles and YES Quest collaborated to support personal growth for Subud youth with the YES Quest experience. They initiated the training process for more facilitators, and Seven Circles evaluated how the program could become a regular part of their retreat for both Subud and non-Subud youth. In 2005, MSF provided a grant of US\$10,000 in support of this effort.
