Major renovations were undertaken in 2008 at the Big House; it was in great need of renovation and refurbishment after decades of use. The Muhammad Subuh Foundation provided a loan of US\$50,000 to undertake these renovations under the care of Yayasan Muhammad Subuh ("YMS"), a charitable foundation dedicated to preserving and promoting the life's work of Bapak Muhammad Subuh Sumohadiwidjojo. After renovations were complete, the building was renamed "Adi Puri", which means "beautiful house". The ground-floor gallery has audiovisual components to acquaint people with the life of Bapak. The Amanecer International Center is situated in a rural setting on a hill with a view of the mountains and snow-capped peaks of the Central Andes mountain range. It was built during 1991-1993, and is situated on 6.8 hectares; 12 kilometers from Armenia, in the center of Colombia. The Muhammad Subuh Great Hall in Amanecer is held on behalf of the World Subud Association by MSF Colombia through an MSF grant of \$250,000.

Designed by Muchtar Martins, an architect in Subud, the hall is much admired for its beauty and originality. Designed for large numbers of people, there is space enough to have simultaneous meetings, which was especially helpful during the Subud World Congress of 1993, held at Amanecer. Owning our own congress facilities enables us to channel Congress revenues back to Subud.

The 2000 square meter hall has a capacity for 1000 seated people and has seven rooms surrounding it as an independent annex for meetings of up to 40 people per room. The hall's conference and meeting facilities, coupled with conference management experience and expertise developed since 1993, make it a favoured venue for large and prestigious events and gatherings.

Three local Subud enterprises, a school, a hostel and a restaurant, generate most of the funds for sustaining Amanecer.

The group in Banja Luka, newly-formed in 2007, did not have any premises to meet together. As a result, members were practicing Subud in their own homes. One member - Iskandar - who had travelled to Belgrade and seen how beneficial meeting regularly together could be, was determined to try to emulate his Serbian counterparts and form a solid group who would practice Subud together rather than separately.

During their October visit to Bosnia, the international helpers called on MSF to assist the group through the provision of \$400 to cover the first three months' rent.

The Subud group in Beirut grew significantly in 2007 and 2008 and its members were looking for a place where all could gather regularly together. MSF provided a grant of \$2,000 to support the rental of meeting facilities, and during their recent visit to Lebanon, the international helpers reported that the meeting room (around 30m2) presently rented by the Beirut group is nicely furnished and comfortable. However, a more permanent solution is considered necessary by the group.

In 2008, the Muhammad Subuh Foundation awarded \$13,842 from the Parker Fund to the Subud Australia national committee. In addition, earmarked funds amounting to \$2,500 were forwarded to Subud Australia, bringing the total to \$16,342. A portion of these funds went to the Subud Canberra Building Project. Initial work has begun on the site and, as of September 2009, the water component of the application for connection has been approved, whilst approval for the connection of electricity and sewage has yet to be granted. The erecting of the outer retaining wall of the building will probably commence in November 2009, when all the services have been installed. The wall will be entirely made of tyres, filled with earth and rendered on the outside.

The Cherkassy Subud Group, located in the central part of Ukraine, was established in July 1992 and has about 30 members. They used to meet in different rented premises until May 1997 when they moved into their own house. To help Subud Cherkassy acquire and renovate the property, the Muhammad Subuh Foundation provided a grant of US\$16,000 and a loan of US\$16,000.

In 1999, a further grant of \$7000 was made for the heating system. In October 2007, the loan was repaid in full.

Subsequently, a grant of US\$8,000 was awarded in 2010 for the purchase of land adjacent to their existing Subud House. This expansion will provide them with further opportunities for growth of their Center.

At a Western Europe Zone 3 meeting in France in 1997, there was a strong feeling of mutual help among the countries involved. This spirit of *"Mutuo Soccorso"*, or mutual help, found its first expression in the "Subud House in Italy" project.

In less than a month premises were found, a feasibility study was done and fundraising started. The Florence Subud House, a ground-floor apartment in the heart of Florence, has a floor area of 110 square meters (1000 sq. ft.). The cost to acquire it, including all taxes, fees and

restorations, was US\$ 125,000. The house is centrally located: a ten-minute walking distance from the central rail station (Santa Maria Novella) and very close to the monuments and museums of the historical city. (These include: Michelangelo's David, the Uffizi Gallery with Piazza della Signoria, the Duomo and the Baptistery).

The 780 sq. ft. apartment comprises a large domed latihan hall, plus a smaller room (with kitchen) and two bathrooms. The Subud House hosts the activities of the local group, and is used for general meetings of Subud Italy. It is also occasionally rented for other activities, such as workshops or short courses, held by non-Subud individuals

or associations. Subud members are always welcome as guests, since the apartment is equipped with some beds.

In the spirit of mutual help, countries of the European Zone 3 assisted by Subud Italy, acquired this apartment in the heart of Florence. After much work and with financial assistance from these countries, plus a \$20,000 grant and \$10,000 loan from MSF, Subud Italy bought the place.

The Kingantoko Subud Centre is situated in the western part of the Democratic Republic of the Congo in the Bas-Congo province about an hour's drive from the centre of the capital city, Kinshasa. The centre, perched on top of a hill, has a panoramic view of mountains, a valley and river.

In 1997, with a grant from the Muhammad Subuh Foundation, Subud Congo acquired 51.5 hectares of land on a hill 1.5 km from the town of Kingantoko and 3 km from the Kingantoko railway station.

The meeting hall's foundation stone was laid in August 1998. The first phase of construction was completed two years later. It includes a 200 square meter meeting hall, a terrace, a guestroom, a storeroom, and an outside building with four toilets, four showers and a cellar.

As there was no running water and no electricity, no one could live on the property. This lack of water and electricity, as well as the cost of travel to the centre, limited not only the number of meetings held at Kingantoko but also the frequency and number of members who attended. To ensure the availability of water, a Foundation grant of US\$11,455 was made in 2007 to improve water facilities.

A second phase is proposed for construction of additional areas such as guest rooms/dormitories, washrooms, and kitchen and dining facilities.

Lewes is a small town in East Sussex in the south of England, between London and Brighton on the south coast. The Lewes Subud Group has about one hundred members including those of affiliated sub-groups in nearby Eastbourne and Hastings.

In the last few years of the twentieth century, the Lewes Group grew fast and needed more meeting space. The group agreed to renovate the existing building by extending the first floor and also creating another two rooms. This renovation

and enlargement was completed with donations from group members, a loan from Subud Britain, a commercial loan, and a grant from MSF.

The Lewes Subud Centre now has two halls and a meeting room available for hire. One room, the Garden Room, is private for Subud members' own use. As well as being used for Subud activities, the premises are hired out to more than thirty different clients, ranging from individual counsellors and people running yoga classes to those holding larger events that make use of the whole building. It is one of the nicest venues in Lewes.

Subud Lisbon has 53 members: 18 men and 35 women.

In December 2003 the owner of Subud Lisbon's rented Hall wanted it back in six months. The group had to look for a new place in Lisbon's very expensive property market. After a three-week search they identified an old factory space with 300m² on the 2nd floor of a building in a good location, close to public transport, restaurants and shops.

The purchase price, including the estimated cost for renovations, was half a million dollars...and Subud Portugal didn't have any money for this purpose; so the whole thing seemed out of reach. Nevertheless, with the financial assistance of the Muhammad Subuh Foundation and others, the space

was purchased and renovated for the Lisbon group by Subud Portugal.

The centre includes a reception area, a cafeteria, toilets and change rooms, and a medium-size meeting room. On the floor above are the offices of two Subud enterprises.

The premises are used for gatherings and group meetings and they are rented for activities such as biodance, theatre rehearsals and chi-kung. Two small offices are rented to individual professionals.

The Malang Subud Group in East Java was established in the 1950s and has about 132 members. They met in one rented premises after another until 2007 when they moved into their own house.

In 2004 a member donated about 200 square meters of land to the group. The group collected about a third of an estimated US\$45,000 cost to build a Subud hall on this land and used it all to build the base structure.

With a grant from the Muhammad Subuh Foundation, the group continued construction of the hall to the point where it can be used for meetings.

The MSF loan paid for the construction of the second floor and the completion of both floors. The group is already using the first floor for enterprises that will help the group repay the MSF loan. The Malang Subud Hall was officially opened by the Indonesian national chairman in June 2008.

The house measures about 13 x 11 metres and has a big living room and 4 bedrooms. In an annex, there are two rooms each divided by two. It is, however, important to note that the living room and rooms in the annex do not yet have a roof, nor doors or windows, and the Matadi group will be calculating the work and cost of completing the house properly, as the annexes could be rented out in order to generate some income for the group.

There are approximately 50 members in Matadi, and the location of the house is easily accessible by bus and in a safe and friendly area of town. The group is planning to make the house open to the local community for events.

Between 1999 and 2006 about twenty Subud members moved from Britain to Mayenne, near Bretagne, in Northwest France. They met in local houses until, towards the end of September 2006, after a lengthy search, the group found a small house that needed renovation but seemed adequate for their needs, and cost only 27,000 Euros.

The members of the group raised some 8,000 Euros, enough for a deposit. Subsequently, the house was acquired in the name of Subud France, financed by donations from members in France and Britain and shares held by Subud France.

With a grant from the Muhammad Subuh Foundation, the group has renovated the house. Except for the car park, all renovations were done by Subud members free of charge. They are now waiting for planning permission to extend the building. With the extension, the group will have 70m² of meeting space in two separate rooms, and the facility will later put in two small bedrooms, a toilet, shower, and kitchen. This will enable them to rent out the property to raise funds for its upkeep. The building, while small, is in a beautiful setting. It will be suitable, eventually, for workshops on subjects such as personal development. The land on which it stands is spacious enough for camps.

Mina Clavero is a popular mountain resort in the central region of Argentina.

Subud members have created a lovely center on a large — 5,500 square meter — plot on the banks of a river, three km from downtown Mina Clavero. The Subud house is about 220 to

230 square meters large with a 160 square meter meeting hall.

The principal use of the house is for the spiritual practice of Subud and social gatherings of members, such as birthdays, anniversaries, Christmas, New Year and the like. When members of the public want a place for seminars, teachers' meetings, graduations, baptisms and so on, the group does not charge for use of the space and only requires payment for a 45 kilogram gas cylinder for heat in winter and a small fee for cleaning the place.

Near the Subud Hall there is a guest house that can accommodate five people. It is rented mainly to tourists in the summer, over Easter and long weekends. The rental income pays for the bulk of the maintenance costs of the Subud Hall. At times, when there are major expenses, such as those for roof repairs, the matter is discussed among the members and somehow money is raised so that the place is always in good shape.

The local group is small. Currently there are five members but in summer there are more as out-of-town Subud members come to stay in their homes on the property.

In 1997 the Subud group in Munich acquired a recently-built house in Krailling, an upscale suburb of Munich and neighboring the suburb of Planegg where Bapak first stayed in Germany, giving several talks at the end of 1957. The house has a fully-equipped kitchen and two guestrooms. Since 2009, Subud Munich has acquired a new stand-alone gas heater and a big pergola in the garden, which enables garden parties in the summer. Besides meetings and sharing an occasional midday meal with the 20-25 members of Subud Munich, the house is available for renting out to the community. The guest room is also rented, and the rental income helps to defray running costs of the house.

Larger Subud gatherings are becoming regular events in Subud Munich, with members from South Germany, Austria, and Switzerland in attendance. In addition, the German national helpers and national committee frequently enjoy using the premises to conduct their business.

As the financial commitment was large for both the group and Subud Germany, MSF's assistance was sought resulting in a 1998 grant of DM10,000 (US\$ 5,625).

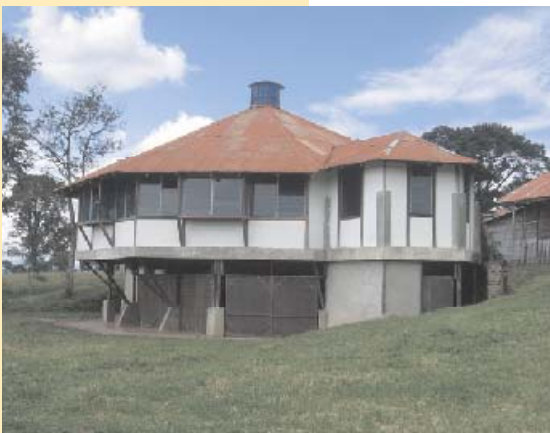
On a 1000 square metres of land donated by a member of the group, the first stone for Wisma Subud Palangkaraya was laid on 20th July 1999. The building cost of about \$20,000 was provided by donations, both, from members of the group and from further afield. MSF provided a grant of \$13,000. The area of the building was originally 168 square metres but, with an extra donation from the Guerrand-Hermes Foundation for Peace, the building has been enlarged to 207 square metres.

The house, as it stands on swampy ground, is built on concrete pillars and is constructed of wood; the supporting pillars are made from Ulin (ironwood), while the floors and walls are Banuas wood. A well provides clean water.

The group celebrated its completion in June 2000. The official opening, however, was performed by Ibu Siti Rahayu on June 21st during the Asia Pacific Zonal Meeting. Many visitors attended and were able to share in the delight of the new hall.

An additional grant of US \$3,500 was provided for the purchase of the adjoining plot of land to provide space for a car park.

Popayan is located in south-western Colombia, six hours driving time from the border of Ecuador. The nearest large city is Cali.

In November 1997, the Popayan Subud group applied to MSF for funding of a number of projects including the construction of a multi-purpose meeting hall using adobe and alternative construction methods. With MSF grants and a loan, the group built the Popayan Subud House.

The Subud house is in a rural area towards which the city is expanding. The house is, in general, in good condition with the roof needing some repair. Access to the house is not easy for members especially during the week and on days when it rains. There are approximately 40 members, 15 men and 25 women. Many work as academics, lawyers, farmers and so on. In 2008 some of Subud Popayan's young people won an award for the best amateur rock music band in Colombia.

Sao Paolo is the largest and most central city to other Brazil centers. Currently, there are only 80 to 100 members in this vast country and it has not been growing for the last 10 years.

In December of 2003, MSF approved a grant of US\$15,000 and a loan of US\$15,000 to help the Sao Paolo group buy their own Subud House. The grant and loan, along with contributions from the members of Subud Sao Paolo, enabled the group to avoid taking out a mortgage — which at 26% is among the world's highest.

Thanks to the efforts of many dedicated members, Subud Sao Paolo was able to locate a house in a safe and accessible location and recently filed contracts proclaiming their ownership.

Subud Greater Seattle is located near downtown Seattle in the State of Washington in the United States of America. Renovations started in 2004. They are transforming the building from a run-down old building to a refreshed and renewed home for Subud in the area.

As part of the process, the property was professionally inspected to identify what needed to be done. The list was long.

With a loan of \$40,000 from the Subud USA House Fund, the group started renovations on the outside and were able to fully paint and patch siding, and install new energy-efficient windows, doors and roof.

An MSF grant, matched by local donations has enabled the group to proceed with more renovations, especially the replacement of old and unsafe “knob and tube” wiring with new wiring and electrical service panels.

The women’s meeting hall was completed In January, 2008. It now has ecologically “green” fixtures: lights that brighten the room, doubling the wattage, ceiling fans that increase ventilation and sconces that can be dimmed. This transformed space should now attract many different uses, including weddings and workshops to generate revenue to support the remodeling. The group hopes to have all the renovation completed by the summer of 2008.

The Surabaya Subud house was originally established in 1972-4, and was opened by Bapak at its inauguration ceremonies. By 2008, however, Subud Surabaya was on the verge of losing its property due the cost of re-extending its ownership rights. The location had become a valuable property, located at the centre of town which had significantly developed into a thriving city. The cost of extending the land certificate amounted to \$50,000. The local members were able to raise \$35,000 of this cost, but another \$15,000 was critically needed to complete the certification. The balance of \$15,000 was provided by MSF to preserve this property for Subud.

Tlaxcala is a charming town located in a mountainous region at the foot of La Malinche volcano in Mexico's central eastern region, 120 km (74 miles) east of Mexico City.

Formed in about 1996, Tlaxcala is the newest Subud group in Mexico. Using a design by Muchtar Martins, the group began construction of their Subud house in 1996. They used sun-dried, adobe brick and other natural materials. The house was completed in 1999 prior to the Pan American Gathering

that was held in Tlaxcala. The house was dedicated by Ibu Siti Rahayu at this gathering.

The upkeep and maintenance of the house is done by members on a voluntary basis.

The Tlaxcala house is used for national meetings and special parties. An example is a party held on the first Sunday of August that is open to everybody (family of the members, members of other groups, friends and general public).

Currently the Subud Tlaxcala group has 33 members of which 24 are active. There are two enterprises of members of the Tlaxcala group: a hospital, known as the Guadalupe Clinic, and the San Sebastian shopping mall.
